#### **BA Alternative English**

### (In Lieu of MIL)

#### Preamble

BA Alternative Course will be offered to the general students of Under Graduate (UG) in lieu of MIL offered to the students of vernacular medium who studied their vernacular language and literature up to Higher Secondary level. This particular course aims to acquaint the general students who studied English/Alternative English up to class XII with an advance literary study for developing some literary skills of critical reading, analysis and interpretation of all the literary genres of British Literature, American Literature and Indian English Literature. This course is prescribed only for two semesters specifically in Semester II and IV. Hence, this course has only two papers. The course of particular semester has4 credits and 100 full marks. The total mark for the entire course of the two semesters 200 and total credit would be 12.Out of 100 marks of one particular semester 20 is allocated for internal assessment which can be takenin the form of Home Assignment/Sessional Test/Project Work on Creative writing and the rest (80 marks) is for external examination. In dealing with this special course of literature, ateacher should try to create the students' interest in reading literatureby developing their skills at critical reading, appreciation and analysis of literary genres.

Question Pattern: There will be four short type of questions for 20 marks carrying 5marks each (4 X 5 = 20), three advance short type/explanatory questions for 24 marks providing 8 marks each(3 X 8 = 24)and three long type of questions for 36 marks carrying 12 marks each (3 X 12 = 36).
