Programme Outcomes (POs)

The Post Graduate programme in English offered by Bodoland University is designed keeping in view the socio-cultural heterogeneity of lower Assam. English as a subject, ranges over a lot of areas of study and disciplines of thought and discourse. The purpose of the syllabus is to acquaint the students not just with English but also with the Englishes of other continents. So, along with English, they study American, South Asian, African, Afro-American and Indian literatures. In order to familiarize the students with Indian cultural ethos, values and experiences, one paper is prescribed comprising of Indian classics in English translation.

- To cope up with the global trend and understanding, there are papers of Criticism and Critical Theory.
- Students shall be exposed to literatures not just from centres, but also from the periphery using English as the gateway.
- The syllabus maintains a substance with social sciences for a realistic understanding of life and experiences.

English Literature in Context	ENG101	The paper gives essential background information to students of English literature and inform them about the key aspects of English social and cultural life.
		> The various units in the paper aim to acquaint the students with important

		literature in relation to the socio- political, cultural and historical developments and enable them to delve deep into the subject. The paper moves beyond the territorial confines of England to study about concepts such as the Renaissance, Enlightenment, Postmodernism, Post-colonialism which bears implications not limited to English boundaries.
Literary Criticism	ENG102	 This paper titled "Literary criticism" is developed keeping in view the importance of reading some of the prominent texts of literary criticism. To train students to develop critical insights into literary texts and understand the meanings expressed between the lines. This paper offers an introductory overview to the vast realm of literary criticism. It is expected that after successful completion of this paper, the students will be at a position to interpret any work of literature critically.
English Drama	ENG103	 Students will be provided with information about the origin and development of English drama with its various forms and themes. The plays prescribed for study will expose the students to Elizabethan plays including sufficient exposure to Shakespearean plays. The learners will also be introduced to dramatic genres, conventions and experimentations along with sociopolitical and religious contexts associated with English drama from

		Elizabethan to the twentieth century.
		At the end of the course, the student should have an understanding of how drama, as a literary form, has been used by playwrights as an expression of creativity and as a language to express socio-political issues.
Poetry -1	ENG104	At the end of the course the students will know about select British Poetry from fourteenth century to nineteenth century.
		They will have knowledge about the forms and contents of poetry and the various schools associated with them.
		Apart from knowing the socio- historical circumstances of the poetry, under which those were produced, the students will also learn how poetry also constitutes the mirror of the times.
		The students will know about the rhetoric and prosodic features associated with poetry and their application.
		They will also know about concepts like art for art's sake, transnational and inter-cultural aspects, influence of religion, and various movements associated with poetry.
English Novel: Victorian to Modern	ENG105	 This paper aims at linking Western theory of novel, as it is found in the three essays relating to realism, modern stylistics and women and novel, to the interpretation of four novels. Thereby, the students get an

	ENG106	opportunity to participate in the experiences put forth by the writers. While doing so, the students come to know the convergences and divergences as well. The divergences are, of course, because of the cultural differences. The paper gives a depth to the thinking power of the students. This is not just all about creative insight, but also about life.
(A) Literature and Environment	ENG106	> Students will know how literature interacts with the knowledge related to Environment.
		They will learn about the theoretical approaches related to Environmental Humanities.

Literary Theory - 1	ENG201	 In this core paper, one finds the knowledge about language, literature and social sciences in condensed form. The students have the scope and are also encouraged to apply these for the interpretation of the literary texts they study.
		> The act of interpreting Indian texts in the light of Western theories brings texts to the domain of World Literature.
North-east Indian Writings in English	ENG202	 The students will know about the social, political, and cultural aspects that shape the literature of a region. With focus on anglophone writings from northeast region, the students will be able to understand how regional literature forms a discourse within itself and at the same time how it responds to the so-called mainstream writings. The students will be familiar with important names in northeast writings in English and will be able to identify the emerging areas for research. They will learn to trace the growth of fiction in Northeast India and about the emergence of English language and literature in India with specific reference to Northeast India. They will learn to identify issues of relevance and apply various theoretical and analytical tools to interpret the text. They will be able to identify the polyphonous voices in the texts and the multiple underlying significance. They will also be able to comprehend the figures of speech and symbols employed by the writer within a specific socio-cultural context


